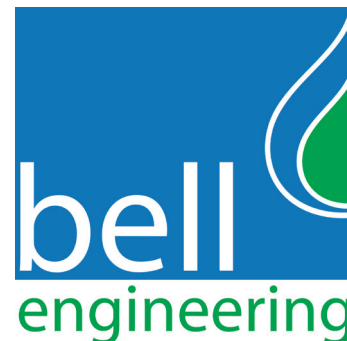

It's understood that vacant and abandoned properties are a symptom of larger, complex socio-economic issues with a community, the solutions to which will take long term policy changes, meaningful investments (financial and human capital), and shifts in culture. Vacant and abandoned properties however, have created their own impacts to a community, being linked to crime, health and safety risks, decreased property values, rising public costs. To offset these impacts, communities across the nation have sought out opportunities to repurpose these properties to more productive use.
